#### **COURSE CONTENT**

This course covers the history of Buddhist philosophy from its inception in ancient India to it's modern day development in both Asia and the West. Part One of the course will focus on the development of Buddhism within India and Tibet. In Part Two of the course, we will follow the further development of East Asian Buddhism. We will examine development of Buddhism in China where the Mahāyāna teachings from India were combined with strains of Confucian and Daoist teachings from the classical Chinese tradition. We will then follow the development of the distinctly East Asian Buddhist schools. We will close with a consideration of the contemporary movement of Engaged Buddhism and its relevance in thinking about the ecological crisis.
