1. What is it about the story of Abraham that compels Kierkegaard to write this "Panegyric Upon Abraham" in *Fear and Trembling*? What is the point of the contrast Kierkegaard draws between the "tragic hero," as illustrated in the story of Agamemnon, and the "knight of faith," as illustrated in the story of Abraham? What is your reaction to this contrast between the tragic hero and the knight of faith?

2. What are the three forms of despair Kierkegaard distinguishes in *The Sickness Unto Death*? How does this experience of despair lead to authentic existence for Kierkegaard? What is your reaction to Kierkegaard's thinking regarding authentic existence?

3. What does Kierkegaard mean by subjective truth and why does he regard it as more valuable than objective truth when it comes to the question of ethical or religious knowledge? How is it then, for Kierkegaard, that "truth can become untruth?" What implications does this have for the style of philosophical discourse?

4. Why might Dostoevsky's *Notes from Underground* be regarded as an overture for Existentialism? What is it about the underground man's reflections that ties together both Kierkegaard, Nietzsche and the later Existentialists? What is your reaction to Dostoevsky's "Underground Man"?

5. Why does the Inquisitor in Dostoevsky's story "The Grand Inquisitor" say that "nothing has ever been more unendurable to man and human society than freedom"? What is the point of this story and how does this story anticipate Existentialism?

Grading

1) Writing 20%

Grammar and spelling, composition and style. Your essay should be well organized. There should be an introduction, development of a theme, and a conclusion.

2) Philosophical Content 50%

The essay should reflect an adequate understanding of the texts. Your exposition of the text should include *at least two quotations* from the primary text material. All quotes should be properly marked within the text and must include a reference to the text cited.

3) Commentary 30%

Your own thoughtful reflections on the topic
